


Discovering Hidden Gems

Life in Alien Territory: Memories of Peace Corps Service in Mali chronicles her eleven months in Mali, West Africa, a predominantly Muslim country. At age


seventy-one, she is the oldest Peace Corps volunteer among 180 other Americans.

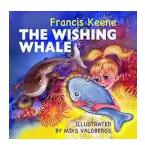
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
