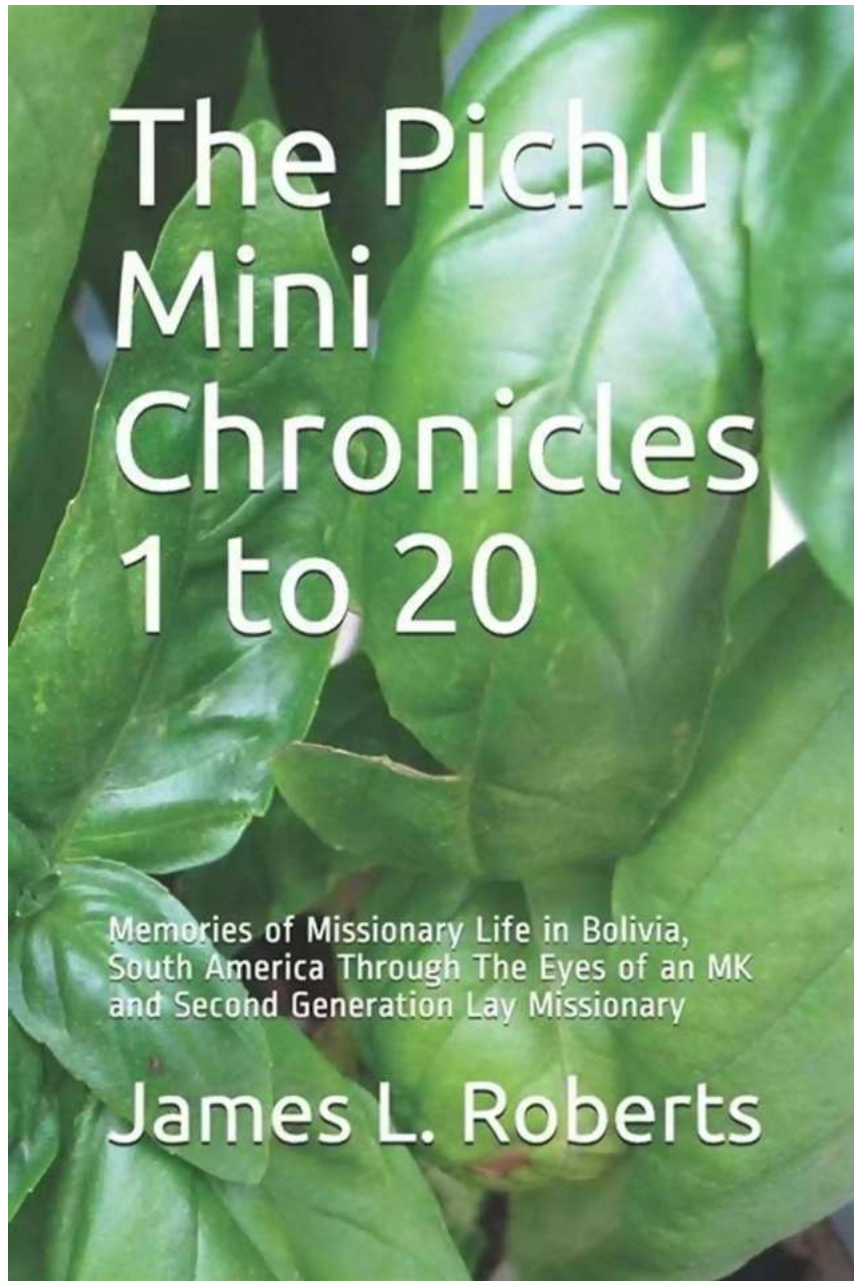


# Memories Of Missionary Life In Bolivia South America Through The Eyes Of An MK

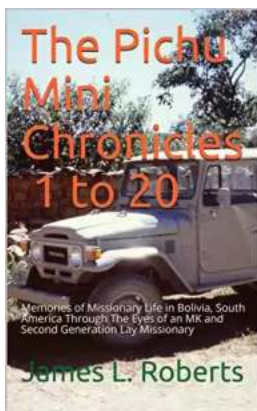

## **Returning Home**

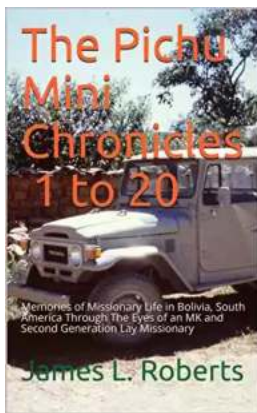
