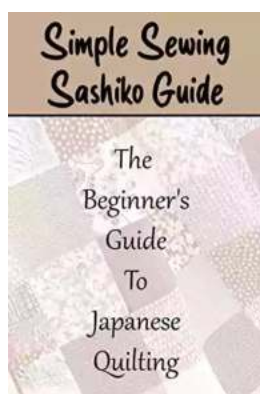

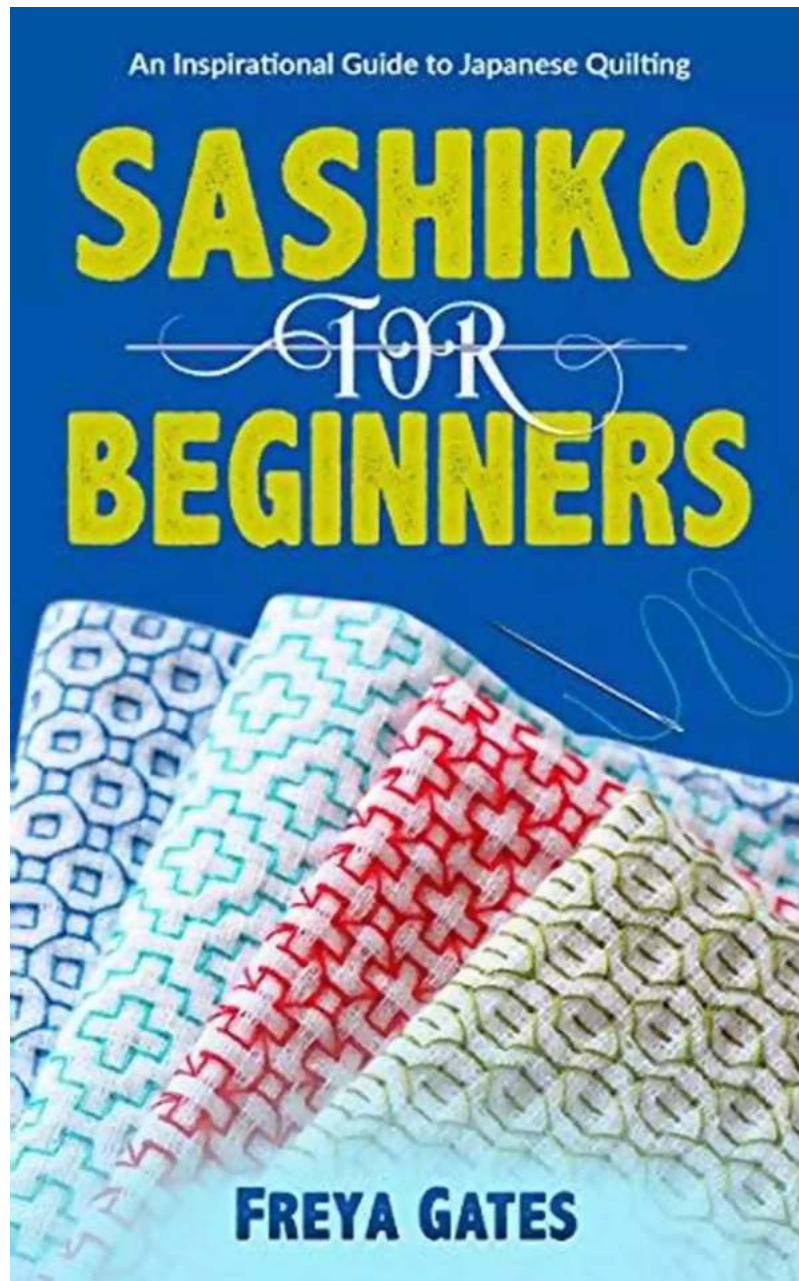
- Indigo-dyed fabric
